Pay and pensions to Certain widows

aforesaid it being a court of Record  
be it known that on this the 29<sup>th</sup> day of August one  
Thousand Eight hundred and forty five Personally  
appeared before me Delila Sashly a resident of  
said County & State aforesaid aged 74 years first  
who being first duly sworn according to Law doth  
On her oath make the following Declaration in order  
to obtain the benefits of the Provision made by the act  
of Congress passed on the third of March 1843, and  
17<sup>th</sup> June 1844 that she is the widow of Edmund  
Sashly who was a private and Soldier in the North  
Carolina Militia as she believes and always under-  
stood & that her husband the said Edmund  
Sashly who was a pensioner of the United States at the  
Rate of thirty Dollars per Annum the Pension Certificate  
for which he drew his pension is now in his posses-  
sion and has been ever since the Period of his death  
which will be hereafter annexed she further  
declares that she was legally married to the said  
Edmund Sashly on the 13<sup>th</sup> day March 1783,  
One thousand Seven Hundred and Eighty three  
that she has no Record proof in her possession  
in support of her marriage it being destroyed  
by fire they having their house burned down while  
living in Pulaski County Georgia the Bible that  
contained a Registry of their marriage and the ages  
of their children was burned up Marriage Ceremony

Solomized by Robert Cobb Esq in Wake  
County State of North Carolina and removed  
from thence to the State of Georgia and has  
been living in this State ever since and that  
her said Husband Did on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of  
May 1841 in this County & State aforesaid  
that she was married to her said Husband  
Prior to his last service and at the time  
before stated as to proof of his service the  
Commander Lashley she refers to the proof under  
which he drew his pension that she knows of  
no Person living who could testify to any part  
of his said Services she further declares that  
she is still his widow

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress, passed June 7th 1833.

On this, the third <sup>of June</sup> day, 1833

personally appeared in open court before the Inferior Court of Pike County, State of Georgia, Edmond Lashley a resident of said county of Pike and State of Georgia, aged seventy years, who being first duly sworn according to Law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress, passed June 7th 1833. - That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated - That he entered the service of the United States sometime about the fifteenth of August sixteen hundred and seventy nine, in Wake County State of North Carolina, as a drafted Militia man, under Captain Benjamin Black and Lieutenant Joseph Peoples, and Ensign William Amos, marched from Wake County N. Carolina to Johnston County N. Carolina, and from Johnston County, down to a town called Kingston in said State, where we joined Colonel Richard Caswell & where we were stationed until our term of service expired. This was a three months term of duty and, and this applicant was discharged at Kingston

and received a written discharge from Col. Richard  
Casswell, which discharge this applicant kept upwards  
of twenty years, but which is now lost — and  
which was dated about the fifteenth of November  
Nineteen Hundred and Twenty nine —

The next tour of duty this  
applicant performed was as a drafted  
Militia man, in the year nineteen Hundred  
and Eighty, was drafted in Wake County North  
Carolina, under Captain Chambers (Christian  
name not recalled) for a three months tour of  
duty, marched under Captain Chambers from  
Wake County N. Carolina, to the Cheraw Mills  
in South Carolina, where we joined Genl  
Gates, from Cheraw Mills, marched to Camden  
was in the engagement against Lord Cornwallis  
on the fifteenth of August nineteen Hundred  
and Eighty, at Camden. From Camden  
marched in all sorts of order, but good order  
to Wake County North Carolina, where we were  
called together again, and discharged by Col  
Thomas Wootan, about the first of October  
of that year. has no recollection of receiving  
a written discharge from Col. Thos Wootan  
to the best of his recollection the discharge was



Verbal, Captain Chambliss not being present, he  
being at that time a prisoner of war, having been  
taken at Camden. - This was also a Three  
months Tour of duty, and Committed to the  
best of his recollection, about the first of  
July Seventeen Hundred and Eighty - Thomas  
Wootan was the Colonel of the militia of  
Wake County in North Carolina; -

In or about the fifteenth  
day of February Seventeen Hundred and Eighty  
one, was again drafted in Wake County North  
Carolina, for three months more, under Captain  
John Brent, and Joseph Popple was Lieutenant  
and William Amas was Ensign, (the same persons  
that served in the same Capacity with us under Captain  
Benjamin Blake) - Marched from Wake County  
to a place near ~~Hillsboro~~ Guilford Courthouse  
where we designed to reinforce General Greene, but the  
Battle was fought by Greene on 15<sup>th</sup> March of  
that year, where we had arrived within six or  
seven miles, and was in hearing distance, but could  
not join in time, before the battle was over - from  
Guilford Courthouse marched to a <sup>place</sup> on Deep River  
called Ramsays mill, where we were put under  
the command of a Colonel William Little, where

we were stationed a short time, from <sup>where we were stationed</sup> Rains, ex Smith  
marched up to Hillsboro, under Colonel Little, <sup>until</sup>  
our term of service expired, and where we were  
discharged - Received a written discharge, and to  
the best of his recollection, it was signed by Captain  
Trent - which has been lost long since -

Ans. In Wake County North Carolina, and State of Georgia, and now in the County of Pike ~~Georgia~~ State of Georgia.

4<sup>th</sup> How were you called into service; were you drafted, did you volunteer, or were you a substitute, and if a substitute, for whom?

Ans. As a drafted militia man?

5<sup>th</sup> State the names of some of some of the Regular officers, who were with you with the Troops where you served: such Continental and militia Regiments as you can recollect, and the general

Circumstances of your service.

Ans. General Gates, - of the regular army, and Captains Trent, Blake and Chambliss, + Lieutenant Joseph Prophy, + Ensign William Ames. - Col. Little, Col. Caswell. Hqs of the militia - And I have already stated the General Circumstances of my service.
