On this the 29th day of April A D 1855 before me a Justice of the Peace within and for the County and State aforesaid personally appeared Lydia Peacock aged 94 years a resident of Duval County Florida, who being duly sworn according to Law do on her oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefits of the provision made by an act of Congress passed on the 3rd of February A D 1853 granting pensions to widows of persons who served in the Revolutionary war that she is the widow of Asham Peacock deceased who was a pensioner and drew his Pension at the Agency in Jacksonville Duval County Florida from Arthur Mc Reed Pension agent. She says that she does not know in what company or any thing about his service.

She further says that she was married to the said Asham Peacock in Ware County State of Georgia on the Twenty second day of March A D 1835, by one Benjamin James a Judge of the Superior Court and that her name, before her said marriage was English Bennett — and that her said husband died at Ware County on the fiveth day of February A D 1851. That she was not married to the said Asham Peacock prior to the second of January Eighteen hundred, but at the time above stated, she further says that there is no public record of her marriage as she knows of and there is ^{private} record of her marriage.

That she cannot file her with his certificate of discharge for the reason that she has never had it in her possession and further, she declares that she is now a widow.

She hereby appoints John W Price of Jacksonville

Duval County Florida her true and lawful Attorney
with power of Substitution to prosecute this her claim for a
Pension to receive the certificate when issued and to all
other lawful acts necessary in the premises

in the revolutionary war, that she does not
know what company or Regiment, or Corps he
served in, nor the date of his service, nor the
length of his service, but relies for proof on
her pension certificate of a Pension granted her
for the services of her said deceased husband, the
following being an exact copy of said certifi-
cate.

Widow's Pension.

I certify that, in conformity with the 2^d
section of the act of February 3, 1853, Lydia
Peacock, widow of Isham Peacock, who
was a private, in the revolutionary war, is
inscribed on the Pension List, at the rate of
twenty-six dollars & sixty-six cents per annum,
commencing on the 3^d of February, 1853, and
continuing for life, unless she should again marry,
in which case the Pension is not payable after
the time of such marriage.

She further states that she was married to the said John Peacock in Ware County, Geo. on the — day of — — A. D. — by one Benjamin James. and that her name before her said Marriage was Lydia Bennett, that her said husband died in Ware County, Geo. on the — day of — — A. D. — & that she is now a widow.

She makes this declaration for the purpose of obtaining the bounty land to which she may be entitled under the "act approved March 3. 1855." And she further declares that she has not received or applied for bounty land under this or any other act of Congress.

Col. Murphy and Captains Cornick & Pate - That he resided
~~in & about the standing home~~ in Anson County North Carolina
at the time of his entry into the service by said draft &
that he marched thro various parts of North Carolina but
was in no battle - that he has no documentary evidence
and that he knows of no person whose testimony he can
procure who can testify to his services -

He hereby relinquishes every claim whether to a
pension or annuity except the present and declares that
his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of
any State - The following interrogatories were then pro-
pounded by the Court -

Quest. 1st When and in what year were you born?

Ans. 1st In Dobbs County & State of North Carolina on the
8th day of October 1742 -

Quest. 2nd Have you any record of your age: if so when
is it?

Ans. 2nd I have none -

Quest. 3rd When were you living when called into service
When have you lived since the Revolutionary
war and when do you now live?

Ans. 3rd When called into service I was living in Anson

County State of North Carolina. - and since the war I have lived a part of my time in South Carolina, and for about the last thirty or thirty five years I have lived when I now do - to wit in the County and State first aforesaid -

Ques. 4. How were you called into service, were you drafted did you volunteer or were you a substitute -

Ans. 4. I was first drafted for a short tour and afterwards served several tours as a volunteer -

Ques. 5. State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops where you served such Continental and militia regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service?

Ans. 5. I refer for answer to this interrogatory, to the statements made in the declaration -

Ques. 6. Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if so by whom was it given & what has become of it?

Ans. 6. - By I did receive a discharge from Col. David Love which was afterwards together with other papers taken from me by violence by the Tories whilst I was their prisoner -

Ques. 7. State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighborhood, and who can testify as to your Character for veracity, and their belief of your services as a Soldier of the Revolution -

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of Isham or Isum Peacock, who was granted a pension while living in Tatnall County, Georgia.

The data furnished herein were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, W. 8513, based upon the service of Isham (Isum) Peacock in the Revolutionary War.

Isham (Isum) Peacock was born October 8, 1742 in Dobbs County, Georgia, names of his parents not given. N. C.

While residing in Anson County, North Carolina, he served four tours of two months each as a private under Captains Hoy, Council, Pate, Colonels Robeson or Robenson, Culp, and Murphy, with the North Carolina troops. He stated that he was taken prisoner by the Tories, no further details given, and there are no definite dates of his service shown.

He lived in South Carolina sometime after the Revolution. He was allowed pension on his application executed, February 11, 1833, at which time he was a resident of Tatnall County, Georgia. His signature then "Isum Peacock".

He had moved in 1845 from Tatnall County, to Florida. He died in the month of February, 1851 in

Ware County, Georgia, while on a visit there to "some
of his grandchildren"; names of grandchildren ~~not~~
given.

The soldier, Isum Peacock, married March 22, 1835
in Ware County, Georgia, Lydia Bennett.

The widow, Lydia Peacock, was allowed pension
on her application executed April 29, 1855, then a
resident of Duval County, Florida, and gave her age,
ninety-four years. She gave her age in 1857 as
eighty-five years, then living in Duval County, with
relatives, names not given. There is no explanation
given as to the discrepancy in her age.

In order to obtain information relative to the
last payment of pension, name and address of person
paid, and possibly the date of death of the widow,
Lydia Peacock, you should address The Comptroller
General, General Accounting Office, Records Division,
Washington, D. C., and give the following:
